- **2015 Columbia University and NYC ASCENT Postdoc Research and Career Symposium**

The 2015 Columbia University Postdoc Research and Career Symposium will feature a postdoc research poster session with 100 posters presented and prizes awarded, five short research talks by postdocs with awards given to those selected, a keynote talk by Dr. George Yancopoulos, President and CSO of Regeneron Pharmaceuticals, Inc., a networking reception, and a half day graduate level career fair.

The symposium is for Columbia University Postdocs and NYC ASCENT Fellows to present their research to the Columbia University research community, network and form new interdisciplinary collaborations, and learn about career opportunities with featured employers

The symposium will occur on the afternoons of Thursday, September 17<sup>th</sup> 2015 and Friday, September 18<sup>th</sup> on the Morningside Campus, Lerner Hall Roone Auditorium and Cinema. The postdoc poster session, research talks, keynote talk, and reception will occur on September 17<sup>th</sup> while the career fair (registration required) will take place on Friday, September 18<sup>th</sup>.

The symposium is for all postdocs at Columbia University and all ASCENT fellows. All members of the Columbia University research community are invited to attend the postdoc symposium sessions taking place on Thursday, September 17<sup>th</sup>. The event has been co-organized by the Columbia University [Office of Postdoctoral Affairs \(OPA\)](#) and the [NYC ASCENT Program](#) with assistance from members of the University's Postdoc Council. The graduate student and postdoc career fair was organized by the [Center for Career Education](#) in partnership with OPA and NYC ASCENT.

The initial abstract submission period will run from June 22<sup>nd</sup> through July 20<sup>th</sup> for consideration for oral presentations or poster presentations. A late abstract submission period will run from July 21<sup>st</sup> through August 17<sup>th</sup> for consideration for poster presentation if space permits.

- **Transitioning to Research Independence Course**

After securing a faculty position, a new principle investigator must establish their lab, hire staff, secure funding, publish, mentor trainees, serve on committees, and form collaborations, all whilst preparing for tenure. Making the transition from training as a postdoc to running a lab as a principle investigator can thus be a daunting process. Even the first step in this endeavor, applying and interviewing for faculty positions and negotiating an offer may seem unfamiliar to many postdocs. With these considerations in mind, this 10 session course in scientific management was developed. This course will cover topics such as the nuts and bolts of seeking a faculty position, considerations for establishing a lab, strategies for leading and managing a research group, securing funding, and mentoring trainees. The course has been modeled after the *Making the Right Moves, A Practical Guide to Scientific Management for Postdocs and New Faculty* manual by Burroughs Wellcome Fund (BWF) and Howard Hughes Medical Institute (HHMI). The course will be geared towards advanced postdoctoral researchers and fellows who plan to set up their own laboratory and develop their own research program at an academic institution. While most of the topics will be relevant to postdocs in any discipline, the faculty instructors are from the medical campus and will be speaking from their experience as faculty in biomedical and clinical departments.

The course will begin during the week of July 13<sup>th</sup> and run through the week of September 7<sup>th</sup>. The sessions will be held once per week, unless otherwise specified, for 60-120 minutes at noon and generally on Mondays. All sessions will occur on the medical campus. An optional chalk talk workshop will be held in October, and will be open only to those that have met the attendance requirements for the course.

Registration for the course is **required** and we only have capacity for 70 to participate in the course. Registration will be on a first come, first served basis. It is anticipated that this course will reach the registration limit soon after registration is opened, so please register ASAP if you are interested in participating in the course.

Not to be overlooked though, are the steps and processes taken when conducting the research that eventually may lead to a high impact publication. In this monthly seminar series we will examine the research life cycle for a postdoc from research design best practices through considerations for getting a publication noticed. Throughout the series we will use the theme of publishing one's research to delve into topics related to conducting research with integrity. The series will run from the months of April through November occurring from 12-1 PM on the third Thursday of each month at CUMC with lunch provided. The fourth session of the series will be held on Thursday, July 16<sup>th</sup> from 12-1PM and will focus on identifying and managing conflicts of interest as well as avoiding research misconduct. Conflicts of interest and research

misconduct are topics of high interest right now in research and should be of interest to all postdocs. Conflicts of interest take on many forms and postdocs should be aware of how to identify these conflicts and manage them in order to maintain their research and professional integrity. This session will be led by Joel Roselin, the Assistant Director of Research Compliance Education, and Michael Klein, the Director of Research Compliance in the Office of Research Compliance and Training.
